### **Western Individual Class Descriptions**

i=individual; T=Team

#### **Horsemanship Classes**

**W1i.** Varsity Open Horsemanship: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders who have finished in the top ten in a nationally recognized breed or world show competition (QH Congress, AQHA, NRHA, APHA, APHA, APHA) in a western mounted class; and/or riders who finished in the top two year-end standings in a recognized state breed association or top ten national ranking for year end results (see Section 1 and Section 2 Competitions / Rule 3101) must be placed in Varsity Open. This excludes games, halter, showmanship, walk trot, and 10 & under. Riders will be required to perform at least two of the tests listed in rule 3404. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 13. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Open Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W3i. Varsity Intermediate Horsemanship: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders who have won five (5) or more blue ribbons in western mounted classes at nationally recognized breed association competitions, (i.e. AQHA, APHA, NRHA, ApHC, PtHA) OR have earned twenty- two (22) or more total points from a breed association in western classes (including novice divisions) (see Section 1 and Section 2 Competitions / Rule 3101) excluding halter, showmanship, games, walk-trot, and 10 & under. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 12. Riders who have finished in the top ten in a nationally recognized breed or world show competition in a western mounted class; and/or riders who finished in the top two in year-end standings in a recognized state breed association or top ten national ranking for year end results are not eligible for Intermediate classes. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

**W5i. Junior Varsity Novice Horsemanship**: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders who have shown at more than eight (8) open shows or county fairs (Section 1 and Section 2 Competitions / Rule 3101) and have not won five (5) blue ribbons in a western mounted class at a Section 1 nationally recognized breed association show (for example, AQHA, APHA, NRHA, ApHC, PtHA). These riders have earned less than twenty-two (22) total points in any breed association (Section 1 and Section 2) in western classes (including novice divisions). This excludes halter, showmanship, games, walk-trot, and 10 & under. Riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 – 9. Riders who have won five (5) or more blue ribbons in western mounted classes at nationally recognized breed association competitions OR have earned twenty-two (22) or more total points from a breed association in western classes (including novice divisions) are not eligible for Novice Horsemanship. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Novice Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W7i. Junior Varsity Beginner Horsemanship Walk/Jog/Lope: Open to riders in grades 9-12 who are not eligible for Novice level classes, but should must be experienced enough to lope an unfamiliar animal in a group. These riders should be capable of performing Western tests 1 - 6 and may have participated in camp shows and in-house farm shows (Section 3 Competitions / Rule 3101). Riders may not have shown at a lope in more than eight (8) open shows (for example, 4H events and county fairs) and non-breed specific shows (Section 2 and Section 3 Competitions / Rule 3101). To be eligible for Class 7, riders must have at least one year continuous professional instruction, must demonstrate proficiency at a jog and lope, and must be capable of competing on a variety of unfamiliar horses. Riders may not cross-enter Western Class 8 Walk/Jog. Riders who have shown at a lope in more than eight (8) open shows or non-breed specific shows are not eligible for Beginner Horsemanship. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Beginner Walk/Jog/Lope Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W8i. Junior Varsity Beginner Horsemanship Walk/Jog: Open to riders in grades 9-12 who meet criteria for Class 7 but are not yet ready to compete on an unfamiliar horse at a lope. To be eligible for Class 8, riders must have at least six months continuous professional instruction, must demonstrate proficiency at a jog, and must be capable of competing on a variety of unfamiliar horses. These riders should be capable of performing Western tests 1-6 and may have participated in camp shows and in-house farm shows (Section 3 Competitions / Rule 3101). Individual points will be tracked in Class 8 Walk/Jog for post season qualification. No team points will be awarded in Class 8 Walk/Jog during regular or post season shows. Reference rule 3205.2 for advancement criteria. Riders may not cross-enter Western Class 7 Walk/Jog/Lope. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points.

**W9i.** Future Intermediate Horsemanship: Open to riders in grades 4-8 who meet the criteria for Western Horsemanship Class 1 or 3 and/or are capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 12. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have

participated in a minimum of two (2) Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

**W11i.** Future Novice Horsemanship: Open to riders in grades 4-8 who meet the criteria for Western Horsemanship Class 5 and/or who are capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 9. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Novice Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W13i. Future Beginner Horsemanship Walk/Jog/Lope: Open to riders in grades 4-8 who meet the criteria for Western Horsemanship Class 7. Riders may not cross-enter Class 14 Walk/Jog. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 6. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Beginner Walk/Jog/Lope Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

**W14i. Future Beginner Horsemanship Walk/Jog:** Open to riders in grades 4-8 who meet the criteria for Western Horsemanship Class 8. To be eligible for Class 8, riders must have at least six months continuous professional instruction, must demonstrate proficiency at a jog, and must be capable of competing on a variety of unfamiliar horses. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 6. Individual points will be tracked in Class 14 Walk/Jog for post season qualification. No team points will be awarded in Class 14 Walk/Jog during regular or post season shows. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points.

#### **Reining and Ranch Classes**

**W2i. Varsity Open Reining**: Open to riders in grades 9-12 competing in the Varsity Open Horsemanship. Riders participating in Varsity Open Reining are expected to compete throughout the season in Varsity Open Horsemanship. Riders should have a minimum of one-year professional reining instruction. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Open Horsemanship classes. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participate in a minimum of two (2) Open Reining classes and two (2) Open Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

**W4i. Varsity Intermediate Reining**: Open to riders in grades 9-12 competing in Varsity Intermediate or Varsity Open Horsemanship. Riders participating in Varsity Intermediate Reining are expected to compete throughout the season in Varsity Intermediate or Varsity Open Horsemanship. Riders should have a minimum of one- year professional reining instruction. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Intermediate or Open Horsemanship classes. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participate in a minimum of two (2) Intermediate Reining classes and two (2) Intermediate or Open Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W6i. Junior Varsity Novice Ranch Riding: New class offering. Riders will earn individual and team points during regular and post season competitions. Open to riders in grades 9-12 competing in Novice Horsemanship. Riders participating in Novice Ranch Riding are expected to compete throughout the season in Novice Horsemanship. Patterns must be from the IEA Pattern Addendum and selected based on horse availability and/or horse ability. Coaches should be confident riders can safely and efficiently perform patterns on a variety of horses at a jog and lope. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes, riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Novice Ranch Riding classes and two (2) Novice or Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

#### **Ranch Riding Specifics:**

Novice Ranch Riding is designed to evaluate a rider's ability to execute a series of maneuvers listed in an approved pattern. The rider should exhibit poise and confidence while maintaining a balanced, functional and fundamentally correct seat. The rider will be judged on ability and decision-making as well as proper communication with their horse. This class serves as a bridge between traditional horsemanship patterns and reining, and is meant to provide a rider with opportunities to gradually gain skill in the show arena.

#### **Ranch Riding Attire:**

Exhibitors are expected to wear traditional western attire reflection the ranch lifestyle. Appropriate western attire includes a long-sleeved shirt with collar and cuffs that fasten at wrists with buttons or snaps, well-fitting jeans, traditional Western boots, and a crisp, well-shaped western hat or safety riding helmet. Adding ranch appropriate accessories (chaps, scarves, etc...) is acceptable and helps to promote a true ranch horse look. Shirts with crystals, glitter or sequins are unnecessary and highly discouraged. Variations from defined Ranch Riding attire are discouraged but not cause for disqualification.

W10i. Futures Intermediate Reining: Open to riders in grades 4-8 competing in the Future Intermediate Horsemanship Class. Riders participating in Future Intermediate Reining are expected to compete throughout the season in Future Intermediate Horsemanship. Riders should have a minimum of one-year professional reining instruction. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Intermediate Horsemanship classes. To be eligible for post season competition in team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Intermediate Reining classes and two (2) Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W12i. Future Novice Ranch Riding: New class offering. Riders will earn individual and team points during regular and post season competitions. Open to riders in grades 4-8 competing in Novice Horsemanship. Riders participating in Novice Ranch Riding are expected to compete throughout the season in Novice Horsemanship. Patterns must be from the IEA Pattern Addendum and selected based on horse availability and/or horse ability. Coaches should be confident riders can safely and efficiently perform patterns on a variety of horses at a jog and lope. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes, riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Novice Ranch Riding classes and two (2) Novice or Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

Riders who have finished in the top ten in a nationally recognized breed or world show competition (QH Congress, AQHA, NRHA, APHA, APHA, PtHA) in a western mounted class; and/or riders who finished in the top two year-end standings in a recognized state breed association or top ten national ranking for year end results (see Section 1 and Section 2 Competitions / Rule 3101) must be placed in Varsity Open. This excludes games, halter, showmanship, walk trot, and 10 & under. Riders will be required to perform at least two of the tests listed in rule 3404. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 13. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Open Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W3T. Varsity Intermediate Horsemanship: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders who have won five (5) or more blue ribbons in western mounted classes at nationally recognized breed association competitions, (i.e. AQHA, APHA, NRHA, ApHC, PtHA) OR have earned twenty- two (22) or more total points from a breed association in western classes (including novice divisions) (see Section 1 and Section 2 Competitions / Rule 3101) excluding halter, showmanship, games, walk-trot, and 10 & under. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 - 12. Riders who have finished in the top ten in a nationally recognized breed or world show competition in a western mounted class; and/or riders who finished in the top two in year-end standings in a recognized state breed association or top ten national ranking for year end results are not eligible for Intermediate classes. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W5T. Junior Varsity Novice Horsemanship: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders who have shown at more than eight (8) open shows or county fairs (Section 1 and Section 2 Competitions / Rule 3101) and have not won five (5) blue ribbons in a western mounted class at a Section 1 nationally recognized breed association show (for example, AQHA, APHA, NRHA, ApHC, PtHA). These riders have earned less than twenty-two (22) total points in any breed association (Section 1 and Section 2) in western classes (including novice divisions). This excludes halter, showmanship, games, walk-trot, and 10 & under. Riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1 – 9. Riders who have won five (5) or more blue ribbons in western mounted classes at nationally recognized breed association competitions OR have earned twenty-two (22) or more total points from a breed association in western classes (including novice divisions) are not eligible for Novice Horsemanship. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Novice Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

W7T. Junior Varsity Beginner Horsemanship Walk/Jog/Lope: Open to riders in grades 9-12 who are not eligible for Novice level classes, but should must be experienced enough to lope an unfamiliar animal in a group. These riders should be capable of performing Western tests 1 - 6 and may have participated in camp shows and in-house farm shows (Section 3 Competitions / Rule 3101). Riders may not have shown at a lope in more than eight (8) open shows (for example, 4H events and county fairs) and non-breed specific shows (Section 2 and Section 3 Competitions / Rule 3101). To be eligible for Class 7, riders must have at least one year continuous professional instruction, must demonstrate proficiency at a jog and lope, and must be capable of competing on a variety of unfamiliar horses. Coaches should be confident riders can safely and efficiently perform patterns on a variety of horses at a jog and lope. To be eligible for post season competition in Individual classes riders must have accumulated the required points. To be eligible for post season competition in Team classes, riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) Novice Ranch Riding classes and two (2) Novice or Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season.

#### **Ranch Riding Specifics:**

Novice Ranch Riding is designed to evaluate a rider's ability to execute a series of maneuvers listed in an approved pattern. The rider should exhibit poise and confidence while maintaining a balanced, functional and fundamentally correct seat. The rider will be judged on ability and decision-making as well as proper communication with their horse. This class serves as a bridge between traditional horsemanship patterns and reining, and is meant to provide a rider with opportunities to gradually gain skill in the show arena.

#### **Ranch Riding Attire:**

Exhibitors are expected to wear traditional western attire reflection the ranch lifestyle. Appropriate western attire includes a long-sleeved shirt with collar and cuffs that fasten at wrists with buttons or snaps, well-fitting jeans, traditional Western boots, and a crisp, well-shaped western hat or safety riding helmet. Adding ranch appropriate accessories (chaps, scarves, etc...) is acceptable and helps to promote a true ranch horse look. Shirts with crystals, glitter or sequins are unnecessary and highly discouraged. Variations from defined Ranch Riding attire are discouraged but not cause for disqualification.

#### **Championship Western Award**

This is an award issued to the high point rider based on the total of the Varsity Open Horsemanship and Varsity Open Reining points. In case of a tie, the judge(s) may require a ride off, the type of which to be determined by each judge.

#### **Western Horsemanship Tests**

A Western judge must use two or more of the following horsemanship tests in Class 1 Varsity Open Horsemanship, and may choose from the following horsemanship test for the other horsemanship test for the other horsemanship classes using tests 1-6 for Beginner riders, tests 1-9 for Novice riders, tests 1-12 for Intermediate riders, and tests 1-13 for Open riders. Any one or combination of appropriate or equivalent tests may be used.

- 1. Ask an appropriate horsemanship question that is tailored to the rider's ability level
- 2. Individual performance on the rail
- 3. Halt and/or back
- 4. Figure eight at the jog
- 5. Change horses
- 6. 180 degree turn
- 7. Lope on specific lead and stop
- 8. 360 degree turn
- 9. Ride without stirrups at the jog
- 10. Figure eight at the lope, demonstrating a change of lead (through the walk or jog)
- 11. Ride without stirrups at the lope
- 12. Simple change of leads in a straight line
- 13. Counter Canter

#### **Entries:**

# Entries will not be accepted without an IEA number listed for each rider. A team roster showing proof of rider eligibility must be included with the entry form per rule #5313.

Entries will open on Jan. 17th All entries will close on Feb. 4th Each entry will be charged \$60 per class. Entries received after the closing date are subject to a \$10 per class late fee. The *Individual Western Entry Form* is to be used to enter riders that have qualified on an individual basis. {All riders who qualified per class may be entered. The *Team Western Entry Form* is to be used to enter only a team, one rider per class.} Scratches can be made with full refund before closing date. After the closing date, entry fees will only be refunded if a substitute team or rider can fill the opening. All payments are to be made by check. Checks should be made payable to IEA in memo Region 4

#### Format:

The general format will follow the Rules and Regulations as established by the IEA unless otherwise stated. However, if a topic is not covered by these Rules and Regulations, the rules and regulations of the Intercollegiate Horse Show Association ["IHSA"] and United States Equestrian ["USEF"] for the Hunt Seat Division and the American Quarter Horse Association ["AQHA"] and the National Reining Horse Association ["NRHA"] for the Western Division may be used as a reference for guidance in making an equitable decision under the circumstances. Any decisions made by a steward or show management shall be final.

All horses will be provided by the host team. Horses and Order of Go will be assigned by a random draw on the day of competition. All classes will be judged on equitation, and faults of the horse will not be judged. If a horse should perform so poorly that it is impossible to fairly judge the rider, the judge may request a re-ride. All requests for re-rides will be determined by the steward.

It is mandatory for all riders to use appropriate western tack and western attire while showing; this would include a long sleeve shirt, western hat or safety helmet, boots, western saddle, and western bridle. (Freestyle reining being exempt based on conditions.) Failure to use appropriate attire will result in a score of zero.

- At all times while mounted, Western riders in grades 4 and 5, as well as middle and upper school riders competing in the Beginner divisions, (classes 7, 8, 13, 14) must wear an ASTM/SEI approved safety helmet for equestrian use.

Western riders in grades 6-12 competing in the Novice, Intermediate, and Open divisions (classes 1, 2, 3, 5, 5x, 9, 10, 11, 11x) have the option of competing in Western hats or safety helmets as long as they follow all local / state guidelines and laws pertaining to safety riding (see rule 4508.7).

#### Awards:

- -The Champion Western Rider Award will be given to the high point rider of the Varsity Open Horsemanship and Varsity Open Reining classes.
- -Team Championship: Each team will designate one point rider for each class in the Varsity and Junior Varsity and Future divisions. Different riders may be designated for horsemanship and reining. A champion and reserve will be awarded to (1) The High Point Upper School Team and (2) The High Point Middle School Team. Points will be awarded as follows: 1st=7 points, 2nd=5 points, 3rd=4 points, 4th=3 points, 5th=2 points, 6th=1 point.
- -Sportsmanship Award will be given to the individual chosen by show officials to exemplify outstanding qualities of good sportsmanship.
- -Horse of the Show Award (4509.5) The EHC of each regular IEA sanctioned show will award the "Horse of the Show" to be chosen by the judge and/or show steward. The award should be given to the horse, regardless of points earned during the course of competition, who best demonstrated fair and generous treatment toward its riders.
